A Letter from Rev. Elena Delgado

For the Hebrews exiled to Babylon as slaves, it had been a long, cold winter of some 70 years. The people needed to hear some good news, some encouraging words. And to that need, the Prophet Isaiah tells them that God is about to make all things new and that "the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind. But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating." [Isaiah 65 17-18] And when bad news fades and good news dawns, "Sing a new song to the Lord!" Isaiah proclaims.

I know of no congregation or group of people who have skipped through the years with ease. Do you? This is true of First Church. It has been experiencing a winter of its own these past few years. Throughout its history, First Church has had times of challenge and times of rejoicing in its witness to the good news of Christ. I don't know about you but I feel the congregation is starting to "sing a new song to the Lord!"

There's been a fair amount of good news about the congregation recently. An outstanding article in the January edition of <u>Buffalo Spree</u> magazine describes economic and ministry developments here at the church. An article in <u>The Buffalo News</u> and on WBFO report the award of a NYS grant to begin restoration of the tower. If you've read or heard any of these items, you know there is much for which we can sing.

Regular worship attendance, the return of former members, the vitality of stewardship are growing. Let's sing about that. Let's rejoice in the faithful ministry of the Food Pantry, Family Promise, the Prayer Shawl ministry and Friends of Night People. Let's shout out that adult Bible study is resuming and that the Deacons' ministry of Communion to the Furthest Pew has returned. The Session is starting to hum a new song as it wrestles with the challenges of the five developmental tasks of interim ministry (see "Five Developmental Task" and incorporate them in your prayers). And do you hear a new tune emerging from the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) as it discerns who God is already calling to serve as your installed pastor?

It's still cold outside and challenges remain for First Church. But for now, let's declare, "Be glad and rejoice in what I am creating and remember not the former things. Sing a new song to the Lord!"

First Presbyterian Church Receives State Grant to Save Iconic Tower

One Symphony Circle, Inc. ("OSC") and the First Presbyterian Church of Buffalo ("First Church") are proud to announce the receipt of a State Parks grant totaling \$328,400 to restore and repoint First Church's iconic E.B. Green-designed tower.

The funding is made available through the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation's environmental protection fund for Historic Preservation Work Detail. The project was competitively applied for through Empire State Development's annual Consolidated Funding Application process. The grant is specifically to preserve, rehabilitate and restore properties listed on a state or national register of historic places.

In announcing the award in December, Governor Andrew M. Cuomo's 2016 Regional Economic Development Awards stated that the restoration and repointing of First Church's historic E.B. Green tower located at One Symphony Circle "will have an immediate, significant and ongoing impact to both the cultural and social fabric of the region."

"This grant will allow us to complete the most critical phase of the project plan; the restoration and repointing of the E.B. Green tower," stated First Church Interim Pastor Rev. Elena Delgado.

Dedicated in 1897, the 163 ft. American Romanesque style tower was designed by E.B. Green as an homage to H.H. Richardson's twin towers located two miles away at the Northern end of Richmond Avenue.

The restoration and repointing is expected to cost \$437,920 with work planned to commence in early 2018. The balance of the costs not covered by the grant will be paid by more than \$100,000 already raised though generous donations and grants to OSC, the 501c(3) whose mission is to assure the ongoing preservation, restoration and maintenance of First Church as a community asset for future generations.

Phase two of the project will be the replacement of the building's slate roof.

Formed in 1812, the First Presbyterian Church of Buffalo is the first and oldest religious organization in Buffalo, pre-dating the incorporation of the City. Recognized as a Nationally Registered Historic Landmark, its building is an architectural icon in the city's skyline and an important piece in Olmsted's internationally recognized urban design. Designed by E.B. Green, a member of the congregation and major American architect from New York State, the structure is nationally renowned for its Romanesque exterior, central tower, and inspiring interior. Today, it is home to six community based organizations including the Buffalo Urban Mission Partnership, Explore Buffalo, Houghton College Buffalo, Village Church, Native Offering Crop Share and the congregation of First Presbyterian Church of Buffalo, collectively serving more than 12,000 community members annually.

At our meeting on December 11th, the PNC took a significant step towards the completion of our Ministry Information Form (MIF), drafting our responses to essay questions about our church's visions for ministry and for the pastor. Once completed, the MIF will be posted to the PC(USA) Church Leadership Connection website, and will become the primary tool for alerting and informing potential candidates across the globe of who we are and for what we search.

As we enter this new year, please be in prayer for us as a committee, for those women and men who will respond to the call this very year, and for the life of First Church. Continue (or begin again) to fully engage with our five interim tasks in the coming weeks, that we might know better who we are, who we've been, and what God is asking of us as a church.

Change to Communion Schedule

The Worship and Music Committee recommended to Session at its November meeting (December meeting was cancelled due to weather) that following the liturgical calendar was a needed change to the pattern of our services. The liturgical seasons "root us in ancient Christian tradition while at the same time being relevant to the 21st century. Following the liturgical calendar connects us to the larger body of Christ and deepens our spiritual practices as we remember important aspects of the faith" writes Winfield Bevins, founding pastor of Church of the Outer Banks and director of Church Planting, Asbury Seminary.

This recommendation initially means a change as to when communion will be served. Session has approved a move away from first Sunday of the month for communion to generally following the liturgical calendar. This will provide greater meaning to our gatherings at the Table.

The Lord's Supper will be next celebrated February 26 on Transfiguration Sunday and again on Ash Wednesday. Our Presbyterian polity provides that the dates for celebration of the sacraments be announced two weeks in advance (this includes the Sunday of celebration).







Standing Rock North Dakota

I remember seeing the videos and reading articles on what was happening on the Standing Rock Lakota (Souix) Native American Reservation in terms of the issue surrounding their water supply and an oil pipe line, coupled with emerging violence and treaties being jeopardized. I immediately thought that I needed to go out there. I watched my friend Bonnie who is of the Seneca Nation leave for a trip to North Dakota bringing supplies and yet I knew I should go but my financial resources limited such travel. Then I heard of the Veterans For Standing Rock soliciting for veterans and money to be donated for us all to get there from across the United States. I signed up to leave and off I went

In addition, I met this young man at the Army and Navy store who was determined to make sure I was safe and warm within a price range I could afford. His one supervisor was not pleased with his endeavors but I was saved by a man behind me in line that was quite glad that I was going and gave money towards my vortex outer wear purchase when the supervisor sauntered over and negated the young Marine's plan. You see, the Holy Spirit was fast at work even before I left.

My experiences were many and varied. I was involved in three ceremonies with one getting much publicity in *The Huffington Post* and *Fusion*. If I had to pick my favorite ceremony it would be when a Lakota Vietnam Veteran named Brave Bear and a Lakota Medicine Man officially inducted me into the Lakota Nation as a Warrior. I even was given a Red Tail Hawk Feather which they had to appeal to the US. Congress to still be able to use for such ceremonies. After being inducted Brave Bear asked me if I would return in the spring when I am called and I replied I would.

I am not quite certain how many days I was there as they all seemed to roll into together as I was quite busy. Before I left I agreed to serve the ranks as a Chaplain. Our Operations Order explained that our role would be to serve as respite to the praying Water Protectors and stand in front of them as human shields to the rubber bullets being fired at very close range, water cannons, tear gas and concussion grenades. My expectations were to do this from dawn to dusk and perhaps say a few prayers to keep the veterans non reactive. This all was fine with me .

However, things changed rapidly and somehow I am not quite confident how; I was placed into the role of lead counselor at Fort Yates on the Reservation. Then at a briefing it was announced that I would be determining who was qualified to be a counselor and what kind or area of expertise they would be most useful. As I said ,the Holy Spirit was ever present. I remember saying to God, well this is not happening in the amount of time I have to accomplish it so you better take over here. So in quick time God determined who was qualified to do what and I was able to Triage the counselors with only the confidence of Jesus a child of God could possess given the time I was allowed... all was fine!

I was honored to hear many true stories and made sure I told each individual that I was as I have professionally. It is an honor to walk through lives with another individual. At this point I think it would help to note that being back in an environment that resembles their military experience can be triggering of trauma experienced. Also the plan was for 2,100 veterans to arrive while the counting stopped a 5,000 . One veteran who was a Huron Native American from Arizona referred to it correctly as glorious chaos. Also we were stuck in a blizzard and could not travel.

I feel truly blessed to have been there. I received so much more than I gave. Even falling down the hill and losing my glasses was a blessing. It compelled me to go within constantly to align with the Cosmic Christ that only knows good with no distractions. Indeed it was and it was an honor to be among the Lakota and asked to return. I just hope I am able.
